**THE SOCIETY FOR THE STUDY OF AMPHIBIANS AND REPTILES**—an association of biologists from about 60 countries—invites you to enroll as a member. By joining, you will participate in the expansion of an already extensive program of publications and activities for herpetologists.

SSAR, the largest international herpetological society, is a not-for-profit organization established to advance research, conservation, and education concerning amphibians and reptiles. Founded in 1958, SSAR is widely recognized today as having the most diverse society-sponsored program of services and publications for herpetologists. Membership is open to anyone with an interest in herpetology.



**JOURNAL OF HERPETOLOGY** is the Society's official scientific journal and covers all aspects of the biology of amphibians and reptiles. Issues are published quarterly (volumes total 800 pages; format 7 × 10 inches [18 × 26 cm]) and are extensively illustrated. This journal is included in membership.

- Nesting behavior and the use of termitaria by the Andros Iguana (*Cyclura cyclura cyclura*)

- Effects of reproductive burden on endurance performance in Side-Blotched Lizards (*Uta stansburiana*)
- Geographic variation in cranial shape in the Pumpkin Toadlet (*Brachycephalus ephippium*): A geographic analysis
- Sex-related differences in hematological stress indices of breeding paedomorphic Mole Salamanders



**HERPETOLOGICAL REVIEW** began as the Society's official newsletter, but has grown into an important journal with articles and papers on techniques, natural history notes, and geographic distribution records. Regular columns cover SSAR business, meetings, obituaries, newsnotes, current research, and zoo view. Issues are published quarterly (volumes total 500 pages; format 8.5 × 11 inches [21.5 × 28 cm]) and are extensively illustrated. This journal is included in membership.

- Eastern Kingsnake (*Lampropeltis g. getula*) population decline in northern Florida and southern Georgia
- Additions to the herpetofauna of Endau-Rompin, Johor, West Malaysia
- A protocol for clearing and double staining squamate specimens
- Laboratory protocols for husbandry and embryo collection of *Anolis* lizards
- Amphibian chytrid fungus infections in *Hyperolius* (Anura: Hyperoliidae) from the eastern Democratic Republic of Congo

**CATALOGUE OF AMERICAN AMPHIBIANS AND REPTILES (CAAR)** represents one of the most important long-term cooperative activities undertaken by the American herpetological community. Issued as loose-leaf accounts of taxa (1 to 17 letter-sized pages in length), each account authored by a leading herpetologist, serves as a complete and current summary of the knowledge of each taxon. The CAAR is not restricted to those taxa occurring within the United States, but covers the entire Western Hemisphere (North, Central, and South America as well as the Caribbean). The *Catalogue of American Amphibians and Reptiles* sets the standard for archival taxonomic publications and has been emulated by biological societies worldwide.
